Alumni of the Year Award

Michelle Dubreuil Macek '85

Benin, Uganda, South Africa, Zambia. To some, the list reads like the contents of the New York Times's Sunday Travel section. For Michelle Macek, it's a list of places she has called "home" over the past 14 years. She was teaching French on a Fulbright Scholarship in Cotonou, Benin, when she met her husband, Paul Macek, a staffer with Catholic Relief Services. After their marriage, they decided to stay in Africa to serve others. Over the years, she has been a dedicated volunteer and humanitarian. One of a group of four women who founded a private school for orphans in Kampala, she did fund-raising for the school and served as its academic director until a Ugandan staff could be found. Banunule Nursery and Primary Orphan School is still in operation today. Most recently she has facilitated therapeutic dance classes for caretakers at the Kalingalinga Catholic Hospice in Lusaka, helping them to "dance away the stress and get a little joy in their difficult lives." Her new passion in life is Biodanza, a healing therapeutic form of expressive dance that allows people to feel life at its fullest. She completed a three-year training program in South Africa, and hopes to travel soon to dance with a group Senegal and to Haiti to dance with children there. "I feel that my time on this planet has been blessed with many opportunities for me to give back what I have so richly received in my own life," she says.

Premier Achievement Award

Jared James '05

A passionate supporter of the Accelerated Degree Program at Albertus, Jared James considers his Albertus degree "something no one can ever take away from me." The first in his family to graduate from high school, he found the accelerated program with its night classes was the ideal way for him to complete his college studies while establishing his career in real estate. In his first year as a realtor, he won a "Rookie of the Year" award; within two years he had built one of largest and fastest-growing real estate teams in New England. In 2009, the international REALTOR Magazine named him the #1 realtor under age 30 in the United States. His first book—"Enjoy Success Today: How to Start and Build a Thriving Business...and Still Have a Life"—became a best seller within one month of publication. At the age of 28, he was inducted into the International Hall of Fame of Remax, the world's largest real estate company. The founder and CEO of Jared James Enterprises, he writes for Personal Development Magazine, and is a speaker and coach. This entrepreneur gives more than 10 per cent of his gross income, and much of his time, to non-profit organizations. He believes that "anything that you have been blessed with was never intended for only yourself. The true purpose of any blessing or gift that you have was always that you would share it with others so that they could benefit from it as well."

College Announces Honorary Degree Recipients

The Board of Trustees of Albertus Magnus College has voted unanimously to confer the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters upon the following distinguished individuals at the College's 87th Commencement Exercises, Sunday, May 16:

Carl A. Anderson—As Supreme Knight of the Knights of Columbus since 2000, Carl Anderson is chief executive officer and chairman of the board of the world's largest Catholic family fraternal organization. An educator and public servant, he held various positions in the Executive Office of the President of the United States, including special assistant to the President and acting director of the White House Office of Public Liaison. He also served for nearly a decade as a member of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights. Mr. Anderson holds degrees in philosophy from Seattle University and in law from the University of Denver.

Sister Ann Bailie, O.P.—A member of the Dominican Sisters of Peace, Sister Ann has been an inspirational teacher and outstanding scholar. An associate professor of French at Albertus, she has served as chair of the French department and chair of the department of foreign languages. A thoughtful member of the community of scholars, she has transmitted her passion for languages, especially her beloved French, to her classes. She is a graduate of Manhattan College, received a master's degree from Université Laval in Québec City and completed advanced studies at New York University. Sister Ann held a Yale University Visiting Faculty Fellowship and a Fulbright Government Grant for study in Paris.

Jane Nady Sigmon '70—Victims' rights advocate and educator, Jane Sigmon is the senior coordinator for international programs in the U.S. State Department's Office to Monitor and Combat Trafficking in Persons, where she is responsible for planning and implementing U.S. foreign assistance to combat human trafficking around the world. She also served as the first victim assistance specialist in the Bureau of Consular Affairs. At the U.S. Department of Justice, she was director of the Office for Victims of Crime, also overseeing the National Center on Child Abuse and Neglect. In addition to a B.A. from Albertus, she has an M. Ed. from Boston University and Ph.D. from Duke University.

Lula White—Educator and civil rights activist, Lula White taught history for nearly 30 years in New Haven's high schools, but in the summer of 1961 she made history herself by challenging segregation laws. As one of the nation's Freedom Riders, she traveled by bus from Chicago to Jackson, Mississippi, where she was arrested when she and others tried to enter the waiting room for whites. Refusing to pay a fine for breach of peace, she spent two months in the Mississippi State Penitentiary at Parchman in a cell not far from Death Row. Ms. White received both bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Chicago.

Evelyn Garrity, advocate for science at Albertus, dies



Alumna, teacher, administrator, civil rights activist, Trustee of the College and a most passionate advocate for the advancement of science at Albertus, Dr. Evelyn Garrity '48 died February 7 at home in her beloved native Vermont. A chemistry major at Albertus, she went on to earn a master's degree and a doctorate—both in chemistry, both at Fordham University. She was known as Sister Simon Peter, O.P., when she taught at Albertus from 1960 to 1969.

For 11 years she taught at Jackson State University in Mississippi, becoming very involved in the community and serving as chair of the local anti-poverty agency. She also taught and was dean of instruction at the State University of New York—Old Westbury. When she retired from Old Westbury she returned to New Haven, later accepting the invitation, and the challenge, to direct the development and renewal of science at Albertus. At the annual luncheon of the Albertus Alumni Association in 2003, no one cheered more than Dr. Garrity at the announcement that the College would construct a new building—now the Mary A. and Louis F. Tagliatela Academic Center—that would include state-of-the-art facilities for chemistry and biology programs.

In 2005, Evelyn Garrity received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from Albertus. The citation noted her "personal and professional journey that would embody the mission of this institution named in honor of the Dominican patron saint of scientists—Albert the Great...you have been an engaged educator, par excellence...one who awakened knowledge not only by word, but also by action."

Student in the Spotlight

Diana Velez

"I became interested in science probably during junior high when I was exposed to a laboratory setting for the first time. As I grew older I became interested in a career in medicine. I'm majoring in biology; although the sciences in general appeal to me, biology involves an observational quality that has always fascinated me. Biology is a field where scientists are the spectators to a show put on by all living things, and this life is what sparks my curiosity and admiration. I went to high school at Escuela Secundaria Eladio Tirado Lopez in Aguada, Puerto Rico. My hometown is Cabo Rojo.

"Last summer, I participated in the Northeast Alliance Research Experience for Undergraduates Program at the University of Connec-

ticut. The program's main goal is to increase the number of underrepresented minorities in graduate school with an interest in science. I was able to work in the University of Connecticut's School of Pharmacy under the guidance of Dr. Diane J. Burgess and her graduate student Yan Wang. The main goal for Dr. Burgess' laboratory is to develop an implantable biosensor for the detection of glucose levels to relieve diabetic patients from daily finger pricking. The biosensor would read and detect glucose levels in the blood; these readings would



be viewed through a receiver, which may possibly be a cell phone with the appropriate technology.

"My part of the project was to help Dr. Burgess and her graduate student develop a special coating that would allow the biosensor to remain implanted in a patient. The coating would prevent foreign body response, which is known to intervene with the proper function of the biosensor. The few poster sessions where I have presented an overview of my research work have been some of the many challenges all science students and researchers must go through. I presented my poster for the first time towards the end of the summer program at the University of Connecticut. I also had the opportunity to present

my work at the Seventeenth Annual Cardiovascular Diversity Research Supplement Awardee Session of the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, in Orlando, Florida, this past November. I shared my work here at Albertus during our Annual Poster Symposium in March. The poster symposiums were all great in many ways because they allowed me learn how to express myself confidently and to truly know my subject by explaining it to different audiences.

"My long-term career goal is to earn a medical degree along with a master's in public health and to specialize in global or international health."

New Administrative Appointments

President Julia M. McNamara on March 30 announced a series of administrative appointments and changes. "These steps will strengthen and enhance the very important services which the College provides to members of the faculty and administrative staff, to our students in all academic programs and to our many other constituencies," she said.

Dr. John J. Donohue, vice president for academic affairs since 2006, will serve as provost of the College and vice president for academic affairs. The provost is the second officer of the College and has responsibility, in partnership with the President, for oversight of all academic matters, programs and related services offered by the College. As provost, he also assumes responsibility for the full implementation of the College's Strategic Plan 2009–2014. (The Strategic Plan 2009–2014 is available at www.albertus.edu.)

Robert J. Buccino will continue leadership of the Institutional Advancement division of the College in the new position of senior vice president working in collaboration with the Office of the President and the professional staff who have responsibilities for development and fundraising; for alumni relations and for public and community relations; for the continued restructuring of the information technology services area; and for a new marketing division of the College.

Carolyn Behan Kraus '86, formerly director of alumni relations and special events, is now associate vice president for development and alumni relations. She joined the College in 1991 as an admissions counselor, and has held several positions in the advancement division; she also served as operations manager in New Dimensions.

Stephen Gstalder, formerly director of Information Technology Services, has assumed the new position of vice president for Information Technology Services and will serve on the Administrative Council of the College. The recent expansion of the Institutional Advancement division to include the Department of Information Technology Services reflects the College's recognition of the overarching importance of Information Technology Services throughout the College now and in the future.

Andrea E. Kovacs will join the College May 17 in the new position of vice president for marketing, serving on the Administrative Council. As part of

the institutional advancement team, and in collaboration with the Office of the President, she will be responsible for building recognition of the Albertus brand and for communication of a unified "voice" that promotes the distinctive benefits of an Albertus education. She comes to the College from Fairfield University where she served in the Office of Development with responsibilities for developing an integrated communication and solicitation program, working collaboratively with teams of professional and volunteers. Prior to her work at Fairfield, she served for more than ten years as senior vice president for marketing and community relations at the United Way of Eastern Fairfield County. She holds the bachelor of science degree in marketing from the Fashion Institute of Technology of the State University of New York.

On March 8, **Laura W. Alden** joined Albertus as the College's first controller, a position in which she directs and supervises Business Office operations, working strategically with Information Technology Services to enhance systems integration and process mapping throughout the College. She previously served as controller at Connecticut College and as assistant controller at Yale University; and as director of finance at the Florence Griswold Museum. A certified public accountant, she holds the master of science degree in accounting from the University of Hartford and the bachelor of science degree from Trinity College in Hartford.

In the Office of Admission, **Nilvio Perez**, associate director of admission, has been named director of admission. He joined the College's staff in 2004 as assistant director. Previously he was an admission counselor at the University of Bridgeport, where he received a bachelor of science degree in marketing. Jessica Van Deren, director of admission since 2005, has accepted a position as director of admission for The Union Institute & University at its Montpellier Academic Center in Vermont.

Research Poster Session Features Original Work

Fourteen students presented their original research findings at the third annual Student Research Poster Session March 22 in the atrium of the Tagliatela Academic Center. Representing anthropology, art therapy, biology, cultural history, education, humanities, leadership and psychology, the students came from undergraduate and graduate programs.

Students Learn Through Different Experiences

Each year Albertus Magnus College offers a range of experiential learning opportunities to students through internships, academic service-learning, faculty-sponsored undergraduate research and study abroad. On March 24, the College honored the 2009 Practicum & Internship Students of the Year for outstanding achievement—seven students whose place-

ments ranged from municipal offices to arts organizations and television and radio studios. About 130 students participated this year in internships.

The awards program also recognized the City of New Haven's finance and human resources departments and New Haven's Creative Arts Workshop as Community Partners of the Year for their support of the Practicum & Internship

Melissa DeLucia, practicum/internship coordinator, believes in the value of experiential learning. "A wide range of research studies have shown that students who participate in an experiential learning experience are more likely to take part in additional opportunities...and that is very exciting," she says. (See accompanying sidebar for a list of the Practicum & Internship Students of the Year, their departments and placements.)

Every spring, Deborah Frattini, assistant professor of English and humanities, teaches a course called "Literature of the Immigrant." This year the class is a service-learning course. "We are integrating learning with meaningful community service to both teach our students civic responsibility and to strengthen ties with the community," she says. "At the same time, we are interested in helping immigrants create an oral history to validate their experiences and to help ennoble and affirm their lives." Internship coordinator Melissa DeLucia arranged for class members to visit the East Haven Adult Learning Center to interview immigrants who are enrolled in

ESL classes there. Students will work with a partner as they interview the immigrants, and then collaborate to prepare an oral history, which will be presented to each participant.

"We think that this service-learning piece is the perfect complement to the mission of the College: in particular, students experience an education that is practical in its applications, and the course helps prepare them to become responsible, productive citizens who contribute to their communities," Frattini says.


When I was at Albertus from 1993–1996, the College let me work between and after my classes with the maintenance crew. Together with some of my classmates, we would make sure the dorms and

Alumna Leaves Major Bequest to College

The quote accompanying Marguerite Minck's photo in the Class of 1950's Prospect yearbook was a perfect fit: "Back of all success is knowledge." She pursued knowledge and the quest for truth in her education, her career and her life.

Marguerite arrived at Albertus in the fall of 1946, newly graduated from Danbury High School in Connecticut. Eager to follow her interest in Latin and Greek, she majored in classics—taught by the legendary Dr. Josephine Bree—and minored in math. She once described her dual major as turning out to be a very practical one: "When enrollment in high school Latin classes declined, I taught math." In 1960 she received a master's degree from Fairfield University.

Classmate Philomena "Phil" DeMaio La Viola, who shared some Latin classes with her, remembers her as "very smart and very serious-minded about her studies." Anne Kelley '53 recalls her first meeting with Marguerite: "I was starting at Albertus in the fall, and she had graduated in June. She was a friend of my mother's cousin, and met with me to tell me about her experience at the College. I still remember how enthusiastic she was about Albertus."

For 37 years Marguerite taught math and Latin at Danbury High, retiring in 1988. Ten years later, she was "coaxed" out of retirement to teach Latin at Western Connecticut State University. Always deeply involved in her beloved Danbury, she received many civic, education and volunteer awards for service to the community.

Marguerite died on December 6, 2006; she was 78.

The College recently learned that she has remembered her *alma mater* with a bequest of \$793,593.67 to establish the Marguerite Marita Minck Memorial Scholarship to help provide future Albertus students with an educational foundation for their lives. Albertus is deeply grateful for her extraordinary generosity and honors her memory. May she rest in peace *cum angelis in caelo*.

Supporting Albertus through Planned Giving

Marguerite Minck '50 remembered Albertus Magnus College in her will, just one of the many ways individuals can construct their estate plans.

Charitable Bequests: This is a gift made to Albertus through your will, designating the College as a beneficiary of a specific dollar amount or a percentage of your estate. These gifts are for the future use of the College, so your bequest benefits Albertus most if it is designated for the College's general use. If you wish to earmark your gift for a specific purpose—a scholarship in memory of a loved one, for example—please note that new endowment funds require a minimum of \$50,000 to be established.

Charitable Annuity Trust: This can be set up with gifts of cash, stocks, bonds, mutual fund shares or real estate. Benefits to you include receiving a steady income and certain tax incentives.

Charitable Remainder Unitrust: This is a flexible plan allowing you to receive immediate tax deduction. As your circumstances change, so may your gift.

Charitable Lead Trust: The opposite of the Charitable Remainder Unitrust, the Lead Trust has benefits that include transferring assets to your heirs and maximizing tax savings.

Retirement Plan: If you name the College as a beneficiary of your IRA, 401K, etc., anything remaining in your plan upon your passing is transferred to Albertus. Under the new Pension Protection Act, if you are $70 \, \frac{1}{2}$ or older, you may direct lifetime distributions from your IRA to Albertus without tax liability.
