


COMMENCEMENT 2009

It was a cloudy and chilly Sunday in May but the cheers for new graduates were long and heartening. Albertus Magnus College awarded 690 undergraduate and graduate degrees at its 86th commencement exercises, held in front of venerable Rosary Hall, the first building acquired by the College. Sr. Anne Kilbride, O.P., Dr. Margaret Badum Melady and The Honorable Thomas Patrick Melady received the honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters.

As a member of the Albertus Magnus College Board of Trustees over many years, you have shared your wise and good counsel as the College sought to meet the academic needs of students of all ages and prepare them for the challenges of a still new century. ...today we celebrate your life of extraordinary service, of dedication and commitment to preaching the word in the vibrant spirit and style of the Dominican tradition.

...ever urged on by great curiosity and love of learning, you have achieved not one successful career but several. Educator, administrator, writer, corporate executive and global communicator, your service and commitment have enabled you to bridge many worlds in support of Catholic and Christian values. Dominican Sisters Form New Congregation

Seven U.S. communities of Dominican Sisters—including the Sisters of St. Mary of the Springs, Columbus, Ohio, the founding congregation of Albertus Magnus College—officially united April 12 to form one new congregation: the Dominican Sisters of Peace, who will continue to sponsor the College.

For several years the seven congregations had explored ways to more closely collaborate in their common mission of sharing the Gospel through their many ministries. The Holy See this past spring issued the official decree authorizing the establishment of the Dominican Sisters of Peace. More than 650 sisters serving in 29 states and in Honduras, Peru, Tanzania and Vietnam make up the new congregation. Sister Margaret Ormond, O.P., who received an honorary degree of Doctor of Humane Letters from the College in 1996, has been elected prioress of the Dominican Sisters of Peace.

Albertus to Offer Classes at Asnuntuck Community College



Albertus Magnus College, through its New Dimensions program, will offer business management degree programs on-site at **Asnuntuck Community College in Enfield for Asnuntuck graduates and area residents** seeking to earn bachelor's and master's degrees. This innovative partnership will extend access to higher education for many working adults in Northern Central **Connecticut and bordering Massachusetts** communities. A July 29 gathering, hosted

by Asnuntuck President Dr. Martha McLeod, right, took place at the Enfield campus for those from both institutions who were involved in the creation and planning of the new relationship. Both Dr. McLeod and Albertus President Dr. Julia M. McNamara spoke of the great potential and importance of this partnership in serving students and helping them achieve their academic and life goals.

English Class Shares Poems At Whitney Center

For the third consecutive vear members of the **Albertus freshman English** honors class visited with residents of Whitney Center in Hamden, a retirement community. for an inter-generational sharing of favorite and original poems as part **New Haven's acclaimed International Festival of**



Arts & Ideas, Former U.S. Poet Laureate Robert Pinsky created The Favorite Poem Project to celebrate and encourage poetry's role in Americans' lives. Students read their favorite poems — by, among others, Khalil Gibran, Countee Cullen, Billy Collins and William Wordsworth—and shared what the poems meant to them.

New Master of Science in Education Offered in New Haven and East Hartford

This fall Albertus Magnus College will offer its sixth graduate degree: a Master of Science in Education (M.S. Ed.) for Connecticut teachers who have initial certification. The 30-credit program is structured in a flexible evening format of eight-week modules. Successful completion of two courses each mod enables students to complete the M.S. Ed. in one year. Courses will be given through Education Programs at the Prospect Street campus in New Haven and at the New Dimensions Learning Center in East Hartford.

Dunn Named Dean for Evening and **Graduate Programs**

Dr. Sheila Dunn joined the College July 1 as dean for the School of Evening and Graduate Programs. She holds an Ed.D. in curriculum and instruction and a M.S. Ed. degree in special education, both from the State University of New York at Buffalo, and a B.A. in English literature, with double minors in biochemistry/ philosophy-theology, from St. Joseph College in West Hartford.

With more than 25 years of experience in education, Dr. Dunn has served as a teacher, professor, department chair and director of graduate studies; she also has been a consultant to public and private educational organizations.

Her two most recent books are "Case studies for elementary methods: Meeting the INTASC standards" and "Philosophical foundations of education: From theory to practice."



Aquinas Hall is sporting a new look this fall. Renovation work is complete on the classroom building, which was dedicated in 1966. Redesigned space provides approximately 8,500 square feet of more efficient space for the Information Technology department and the Accelerated Degree Program, and faculty offices. Bree Common will offer lounge and community space for evening students and the Albertus community.

Student Honored at College Academic Day at State Capitol

The Connecticut General Assembly honored Kamala Jackson '09 for outstanding achievement in College Academic Day ceremonies at the State Capitol in May. Each year colleges and universities in the state select students to be recognized for their achievements. Students are introduced to members of the House and the Senate. In addition to her academic achievements, Jackson, a communications major with a minor in English, served on the editorial board of Breakwater, the College's literary magazine, served as a student orientation counselor for three years, completed an internship with AIDS Project New Haven and worked as a sales associate in the College Bookstore. She is from the Bronx, New York.

- "Tengu: The Mountain Goblin," the latest novel by John Donohue, vice president for academic affairs, was a silver medalist finalist in the 2009 **Benjamin Franklin Awards of the Independent Book Publishers Association. It is the third in his** series of books featuring Conor Burke, anthropologist, martial arts student and instructor. Other Conor Burke novels are "Sensei" and "Deshi."
- In June AMC sophomore Heather Cassella participated in the Favorite Poem Project Community Reading, part of New Haven's International Festival of Arts & Ideas. Her favorite poem: "You Can Never Tell," by Ella Wheeler Wilcox. Also taking part was Bernadette Holodak, director of development, who read her favorite, "The Giving Tree" by Shel Silverstein. Robert Pinsky, former Poet Laureate of the United States created the project to promote interest in poetry.
- In April, Bill Earls, an adjunct professor in the Accelerated Degree Program, took second prize in the Gerard F. Melito Senior Citizens Poetry **Contest sponsored by the Central Connecticut** branch of Altrusa International, a service organization dedicated to literacy issues. The award was for his poem "Thoughts as Someone I Love Contemplates Darkness," an earlier version of which appeared in Breakwater 2006, the campus literary magazine.
- This fall a group of early childhood teachers from the New Haven School System will return to Albertus as part of a degree completion program under a grant-funded initiative begun in 2008 to enhance the educational level of the city's early childhood teachers. The program helps them complete a B.A. in psychology with a concentration in child development. Initiated by Reginald Mayo, Ph.D., superintendent of schools, and Tina Mannarino, Ph.D., director of early childhood education for the city, the program is under the joint direction of Stephen Joy, Ph.D., chairman of the psychology department at Albertus, and Joan Venditto, Doctor of Arts, director of education programs. The group expects to complete requirements for the bachelor's degree approximately a year from now.
- In July, the Master of Arts in Art Therapy program and The Connecticut Art Therapy Association held a colloquium in the Tagliatela Academic Center Atrium. Making presentations were Amanda Salzano '09 MAAT, The Effectiveness of a Collaborative Artmaking Task on Reducing Stress in Hospice Caregivers; Maggie Moller Raucci '01, '08 MAAT, The **Draw-A-Person-in the Rain as a Measure of Stress** and Coping in Children; and Crystal Schrade, current MAAT student, Physiological Effects of Mandala-making in Adults with Mental Retardation.

Chapter of National Hispanic Honor Society Established on Campus

Albertus now has a campus chapter of Sigma Delta Pi, the National Collegiate Hispanic Honors Society. Dr. Christine Dolan Atkins, assistant professor of foreign languages at the College, is the adviser for the Kappa Sigma chapter. A formal ceremony took place at Rosary in May to induct Dr. Atkins as an honorary member, followed by the induction of students Anthony Arnold, Theresa Flood and Katherine Gustafson. Membership requirements are: completion of at least 18 hours of college-level Spanish and Hispanic literature; minimal grade point average of 3.0 in all Spanish courses; ranking in the upper 35 percent of their class; and deep appreciation, interest and understanding of the Spanish language and Hispanic letters.

All-Student Production of "The Tempest" a Major Hit



In a birthday salute to William Shakespeare, the English Club presented performances of "The Tempest" April 23 (his birthday), 24 and 25 on the lawn at Sansbury Hall. The all-student production was a hit with more than 300 people who attended the performances, which were free and open to the entire College community. Carolyn "Charlie" O'Brien, who graduated in May and was president of the English Club, had the idea for the production. "I thought it was a shame that there are so many young people who are turned off to Shakespeare, simply because they don't understand it and have never seen it performed," she said. "I wanted to give students the opportunity to become involved in something, with the hopes that it would inspire people, including community

members, to become passionate about the arts and the beauty of Shakespeare."

Charlie, who served as producer and director, stage production man ager, prop master, and costume and set design manager, also played the role of Caliban. Alex Cannon was assistant director and Victoria Gravina, assistant stage production manager; they will be running the English Club during the coming academic year and plan another production of one of Shakespeare's plays.
